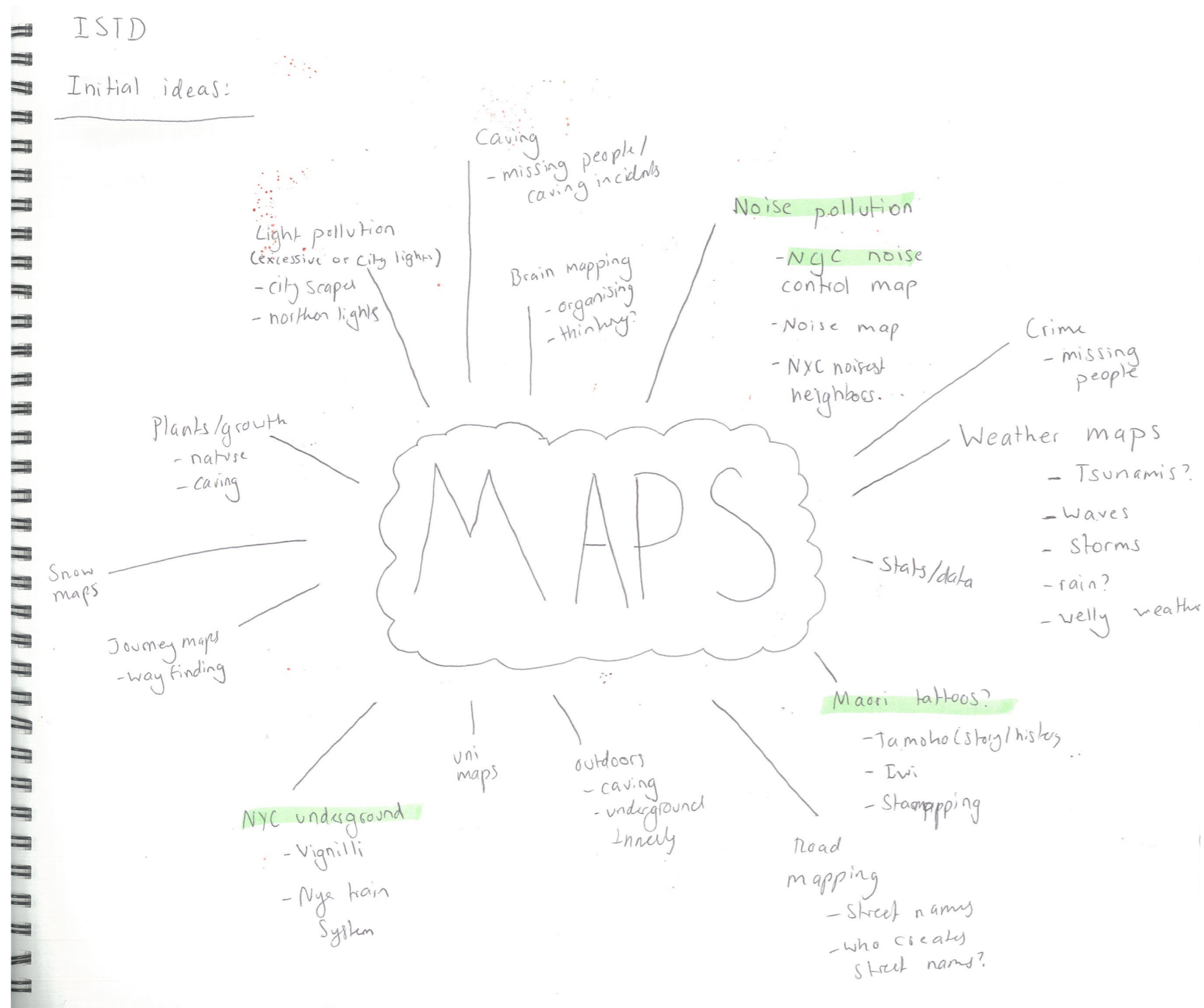

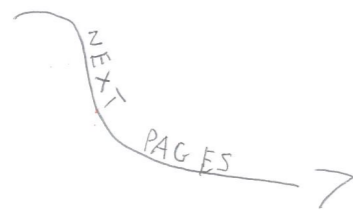
## Diving Deeper

# 8 Mile Road 2010 Census Map

Currently serving as Detroit's northern border, Eight Mile Road was originally a dirt thoroughfare, established in 1815 as Baseline Road during a survey of the Northwest Territory. Beginning in 1928, parts of it were designated as M-102. Gradually, the road was paved, widened and extended.

The title is derived from 8 Mile Road, the highway between the predominantly African-American city of Detroit and the largely white suburban communities to the north that Eminem originally lived in.

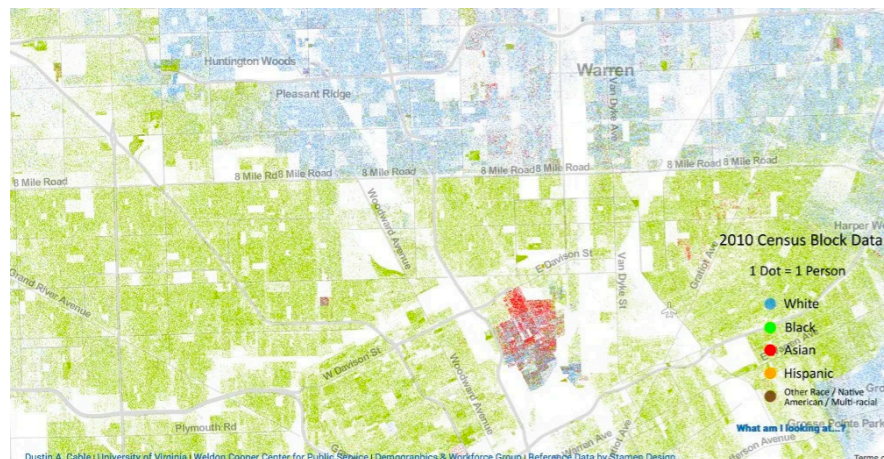
The 8 Mile road is essentially the dividing line between white neighbourhoods and black neighbourhoods and/or Higher wealth and lower wealth groups.

The notion of Eight Mile as Detroit's dividing line was catapulted into the national spotlight through local rapper Eminem's hit film 8 Mile. Drawing from his own trailer park childhood near Eight Mile Road, Eminem tells the tale of a white kid's efforts to break into a rap career. As highlighted worldwide in the 2002 film

"8 Mile", Eight Mile has been seen as a divider between Detroit and its suburbs. This perception influenced not only Eminem's music career but also public policy and private investment, creating inequality and tension. While Eight Mile continues to be portrayed as a dividing line, the corridor has a rich history as a bridge for our region, state and nation, which predates its negative perception.

Eight Mile was historically, and in some areas still is, known as "Baseline Road", a name which comes from its distinction as the line upon which the Northwest Territories were mapped. Under the Land Ordinance Act of 1785, Eight Mile was drawn as the baseline on the first map of Michigan running east to west from lakeshore to lakeshore. The line continues west past Michigan, forming the state line between Wisconsin and Illinois. Eight Mile became the measuring point for Michigan's township range numbers and other mile roads, essentially serving as the east-west axis for our entire state and as the common border for multiple communities, counties and state agencies.

Over time, however, Eight Mile became the flashpoint of regional polarization as socioeconomic tension between Detroit and its suburbs which has shaped our region's policies for more than a half century since the end of World War II. Regional policy decisions have been and continue to be influenced by historical perceptions of Eight Mile as a regional dividing line. Through the efforts of 8MBA and its many partners, allies and other stakeholders, however, Eight Mile's true role as a regional bridge, and its phenomenal potential – with nearly 50,000 cars per day, approximately 1,700 businesses and a diverse population – is increasingly overcoming this outdated perception.





# Paula Cher Maps

One of the most influential Graphic Designers in the world.

Her father was a photogrammetric engineer for the US Geological Survey who invented a device that ensured the distortion-free aerial photography. His job has helped google maps become the technology it is today. Scher's fathers job is focussed on accuracy and preciseness. However, Scher states that her father was the one to teach her that maps aren't always totally accurate...

After joining the world largest independent design company Pentagon as the first female principal in 1991 Paula became extremely busy and successful. This did mean however she felt like she lost her touch with hands on activities "Everything was made on computers, there was no art supplies, I felt completely odd like I didn't really make anything... I just felt like nothing was happening. I realised I missed working with my hands."

This is what later inspired Scher to begin her hands on creative journey illustrating and

painting maps alongside her very successful Graphic design work as an escape.

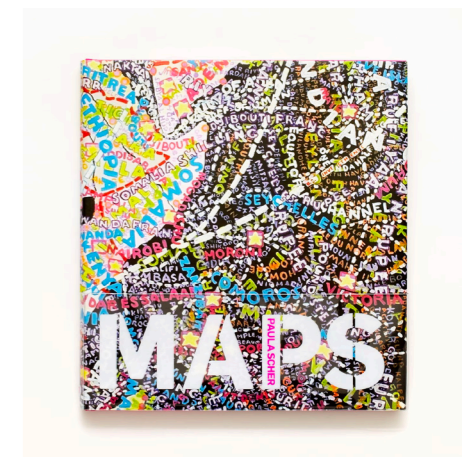
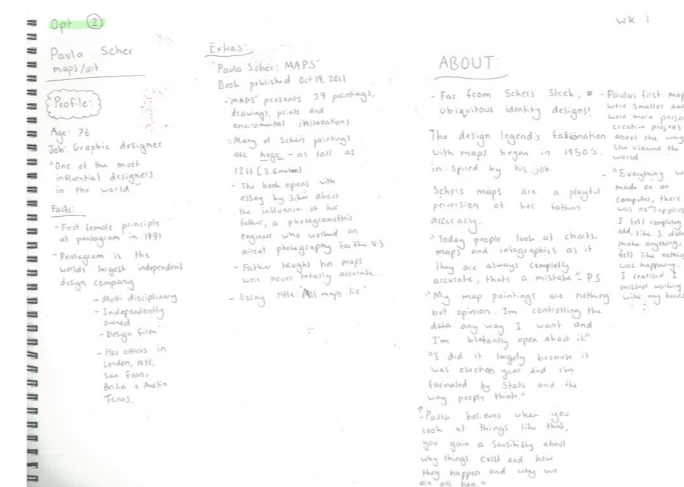

Map style is more than just territory Based on various interesting features of places e.g House prices, post codes etc...

Paula Scher on maps and suspension of belief: Making mistakes, experimentation and play, are ways I grow the work. My painting is all about mistakes. I mean it's my view of the world, the information is in the wrong places, things are misspelled, and I put in what I feel like. I totally control the information. It's my rebellion against being a print designer when I had to layout magazines and get the copy to fit. Now, I make the copy fit because I'm the editor and not somebody else.

"I began painting maps to invent my own complicated narrativ about the way. I see

and feel about the world. I wanted to list what I know about a place from memory, from impression, from media, and general information overload."





# Amsterdam Canal Maps

The famous Amsterdam canal system dates from the 17th century, which, due to the cultural, economic and political prosperity, was also called the golden age. With immigration at a height, a shortage of houses and lack of space was created. It forced the City Government to a comprehensive plan that would make the city five times as big.

For as long as they have been pumping water out of the lands in Holland, they have been building canals for travel, irrigation, and water removal. The famous canals of Amsterdam were a result of good city planning (to keep our Dutch friends' heads above water), and easily serve as additional streets for transportation.

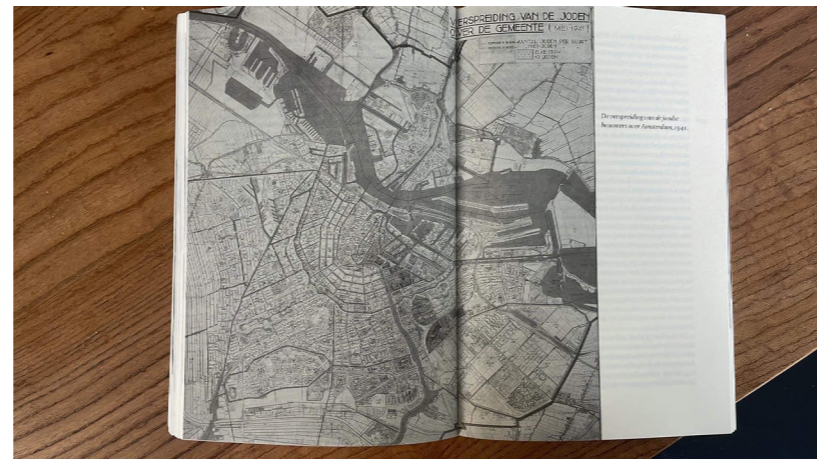
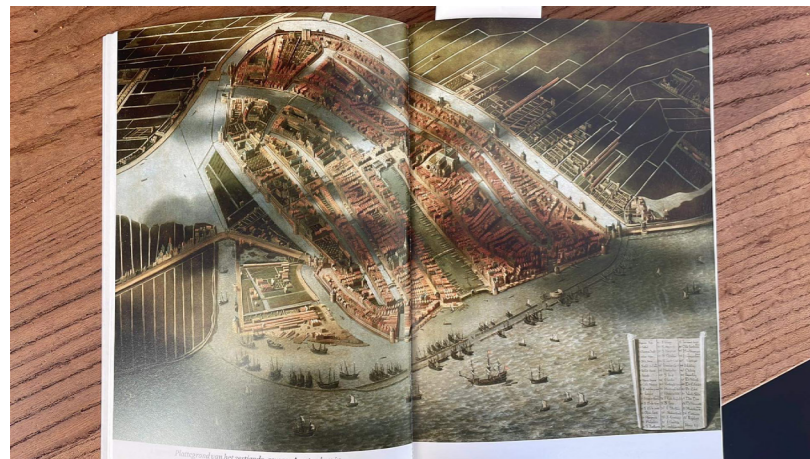
Amsterdam was created with canals of concentric circles facing the IJ Bay in the seventeenth century. Three canals were designed with residential development in mind. The fourth outermost one was created for defense as well as excess water management. These waterways were interconnected by radiating canals, forming a fan shape. Construction was done from west to east, with

the eastern area took a long time to irrigate. Delft is formed in a rectangle with a grid layout of canals. Java-eiland in Amsterdam is a good place to see more modern canal technology.

With the plan, in which utility and beauty were combined, a cautious start was made at the end of the 16th century. The large expansion followed in 1613 when, among other things, the Herengracht, Prinsengracht en Keizersgracht canals were dug. A new neighbourhood at the west of the canals was developed, the Jordaan. The three canals were given an exclusive residential function, they were 'urban palaces' of wealthy merchants bankers, administrators of the city and other wealthy people of Amsterdam.

When originally building/creating the canal system technology was not at its peak as it is now so the dutch had to visualise what a birds eye view would look like. The mapping had to be precise and not having a clue to what above would look like made engineers heavily rely on maps. Without maps, the building of the canals could not function.

I am interested in this topic as I was born in Amsterdam and always feel like I should learn more about my culture and how Amsterdam became the water city it is today.

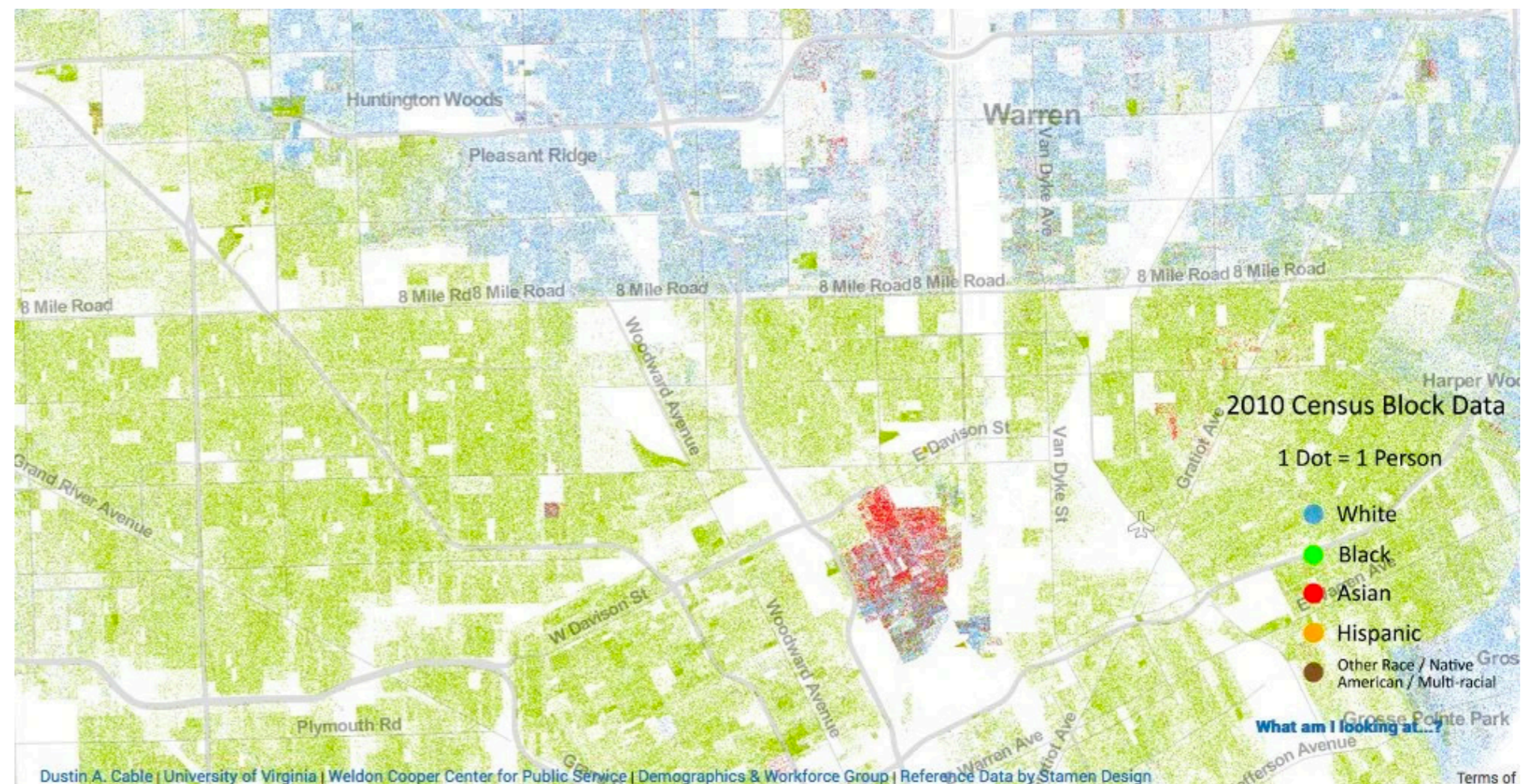




# Topic Selection

This map is what I believe a great representation of America and some parts of the world today. I am excited to keep researching this map.





# Further Research/Findings

Eight Mile exists as a physical dividing line, as well as a de-facto psychological and cultural boundary for the region. As the northern border to the City of Detroit, Eight Mile separates the city's predominately African American urban core from the more white suburbs to the north.

South side was developed for "whites only" Eight Mile Road, which separates Detroit from its suburbs and has long symbolized the region's racial divide.

The problem of racial segregation is not unique to Detroit. Indeed, 40 years after the death of Jim Crow, blacks and whites often live separate lives in separate communities all over the United States. But the problem is especially ingrained in the Detroit area. It is, according to the 2000 Census, the most segregated metropolitan region in the country. And on Eight Mile, the divisions are the most stark. There are eight lanes of asphalt and concrete separating one side of the street from the other, but as a racial divide it might as well be the Grand Canyon.

At first glance, the road looks like nothing special. The flatness of the landscape and the straightness of the street means that when one is driving on it, the road is the horizon line both in front and behind. It can appear endless. There are few residences. It is generally a commercial thoroughfare with one small storefront after another, ranging from auto-repair shops to fast-food restaurants. In between strip malls there are occasional vacant lots, manufacturing plants, and, inevitably, strip clubs.

In 1785 it was drawn as the baseline for maps

of the entire territory on Michigan. And while Detroit's annexation of land left its boundaries jagged along its other borders, the northern border of Eight Mile Road remained a straight line.

The city's racial tensions have long roots. As southern blacks moved north to cities like Detroit in the 1930s and 1940s, many whites simply left the city and built communities that developed exclusionary policies, says Robin Boyle, an urban expert at Wayne State University. Michigan law allowed for particularly strong home rule, which, he says, included "conspiracies particularly between the real estate and finance industries."

The city's population shifted from 43 percent black in 1970 to 63 percent in 1980. And though federal laws eventually outlawed discriminatory housing practices, the history already in place in Detroit has been hard to overcome.

"What creates the high level of segregation in this area is that whites don't stick around long enough for integration to occur," says Cliff Schrepp, executive director of the Fair Housing Center of Metropolitan Detroit. "When blacks come into the neighborhood, they leave." Even with laws in place, subtler exclusionary real estate practices still go on, says E'toile Libbett, president of the Detroit Board of Realtors. Racism is something that is felt if not always seen.

"There are a lot of stories and it is done much more quietly now," she says. "If something like a black couple look in a white neighborhood and they hear, 'Oh, there's a sales agreement on that [house],' and then two or three weeks later it is still on the market and nothing has

happened."

Just two years ago, a local real-estate agent was honored for reporting a white seller, a former state judge, who refused to sell to a black family in nearby River Rouge. The seller lived in another home on the street and did not want the first property to go to a black family. In cities like Warren the racial contrast is remarkable. The small subdivisions just north of Eight Mile look almost like replicas of the neighborhoods on the south side in Detroit. The streets on both sides are lined with small, largely well-kept houses populated mostly by blue-collar workers.

But color line remains marked. When a Warren high school put up new basketball hoops here and blacks began coming north to use them, the district's response was to take the rims down. The school said neighborhood complaints about noise were the reason, but many suspected subtle racism.

However, whites who live in the area maintain they face complicated issues. Even if they harbor no racial animosity, they say they are hostage to the environment. Because area whites don't want to live near blacks, the arrival of a single black family in their neighborhood means their property values will likely drop. And, of course, the long-standing racial tensions here also mean blacks are not particularly interested in living near whites - particularly in some areas.

The problem of racial segregation is not unique to Detroit. Indeed, 40 years after the death of Jim Crow, blacks and whites often live separate

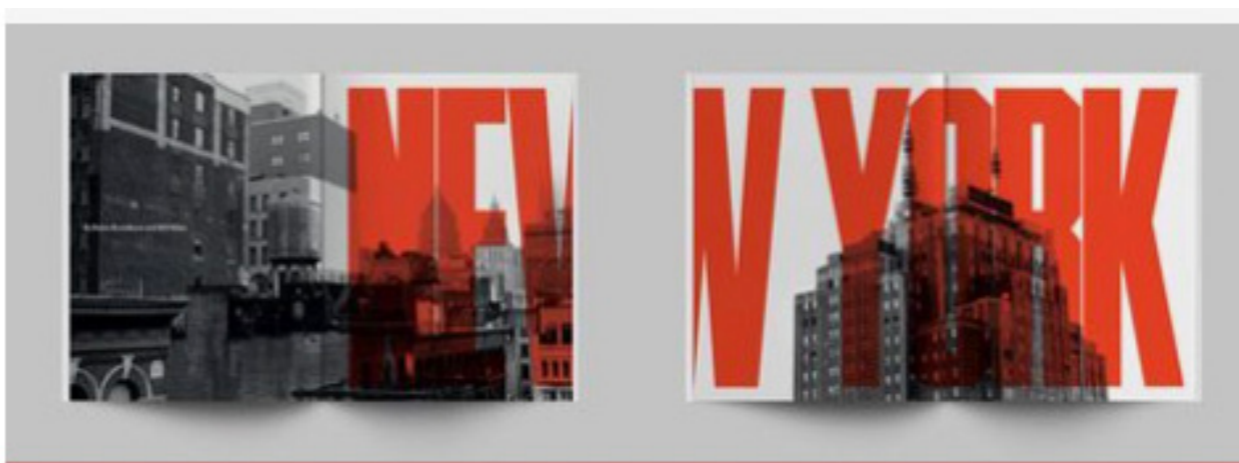
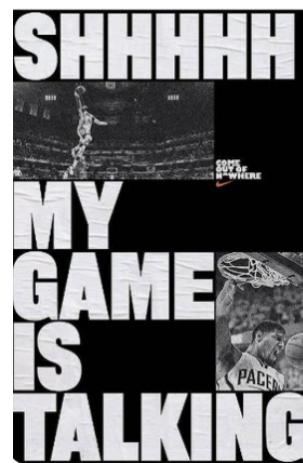
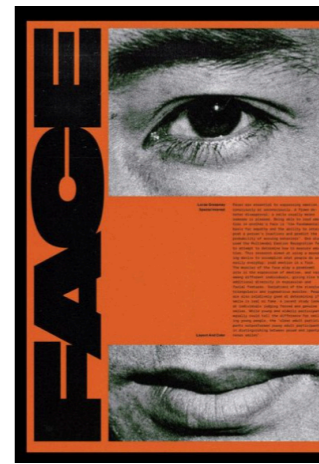
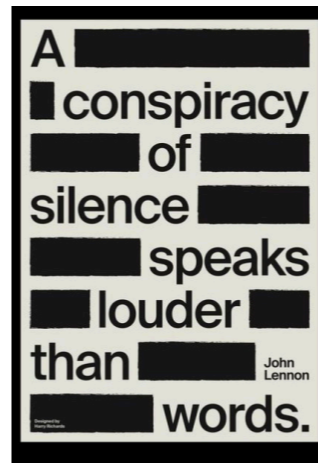
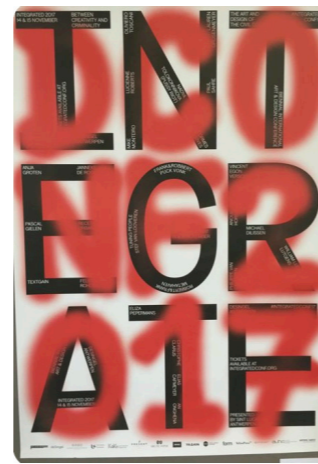

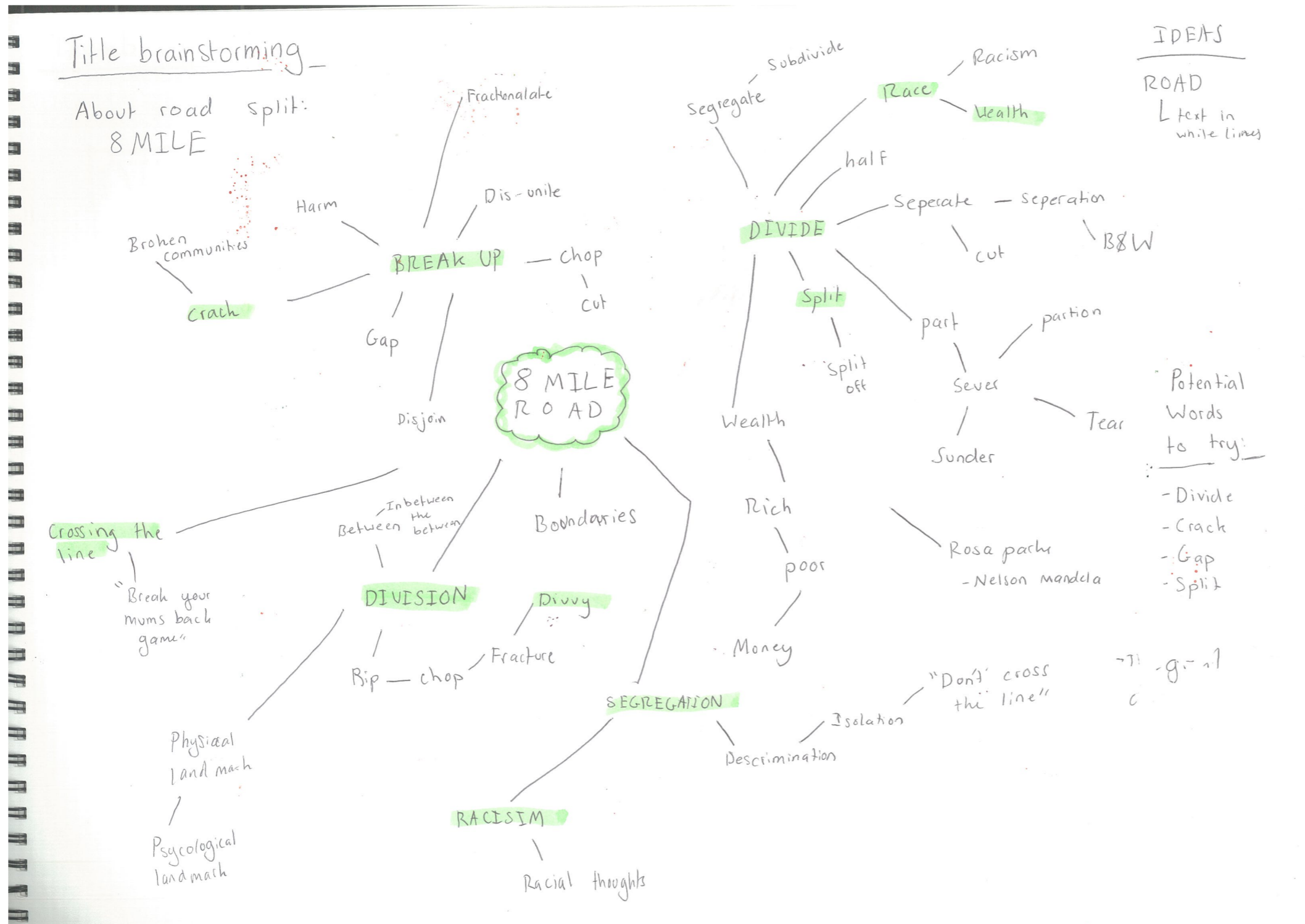
# Examining Precedents

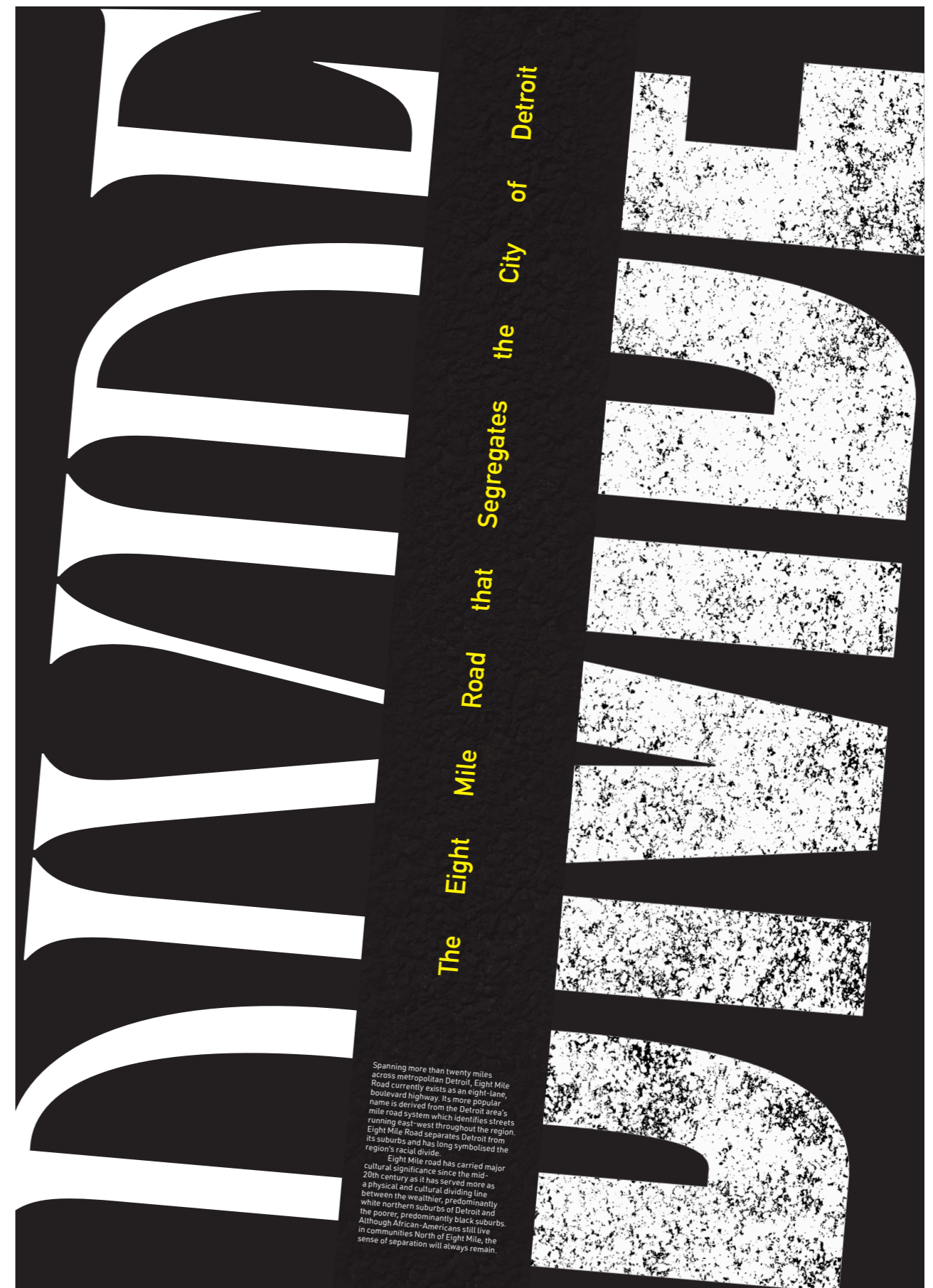
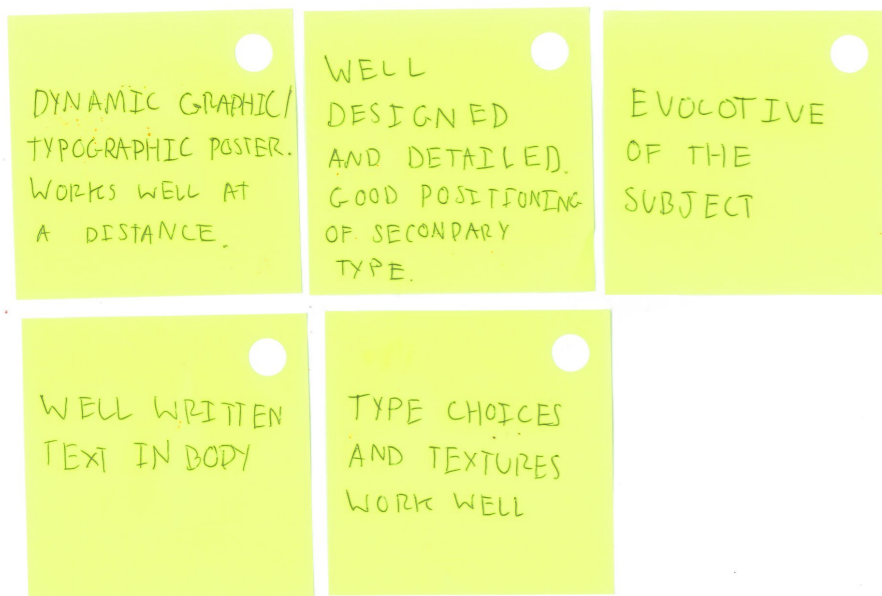


# Final Poster

[3] I want the look & feel of my North book to be luxurious and to use tight inner spacing.

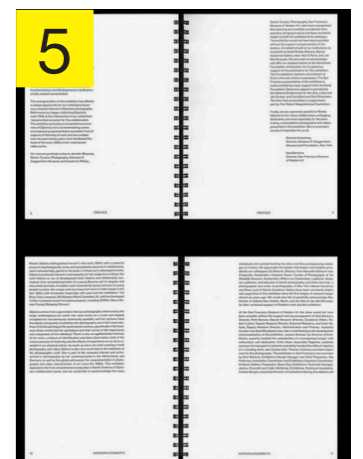
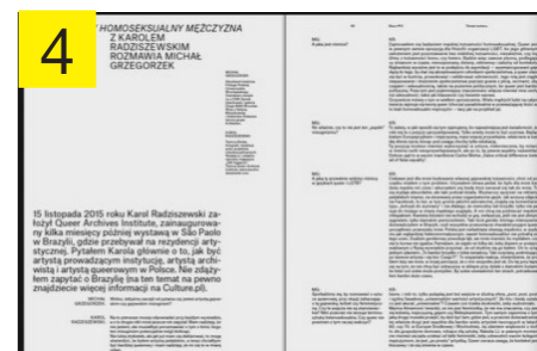

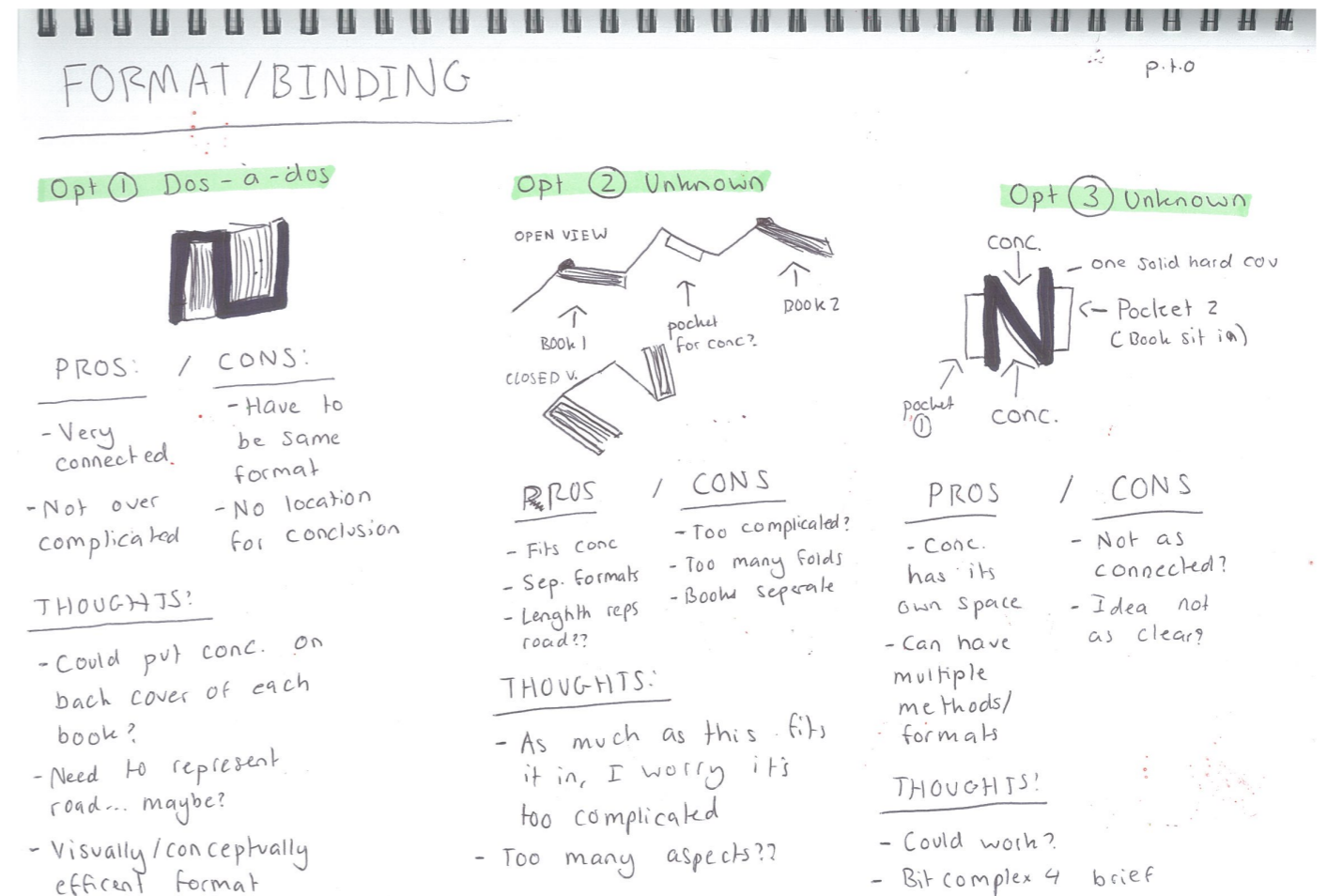
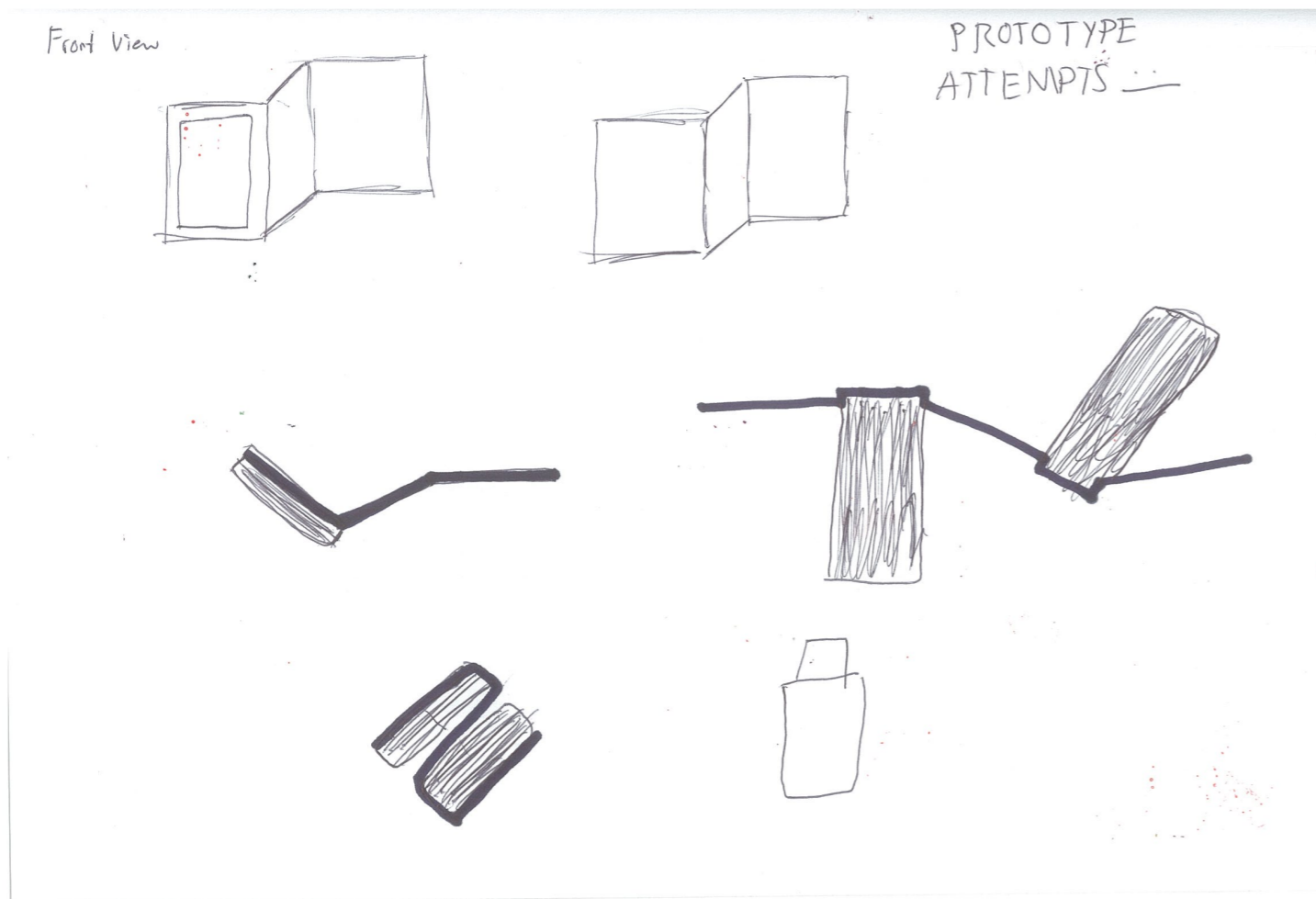
GT America felt fitting for my topic/book as it has such a large ranges of widths and weights.

GT America is not only related to my topic with the wide like theme but it is also the missing bridge between 19th century American Gothics and 20th century European Neo-Grotesk typefaces.

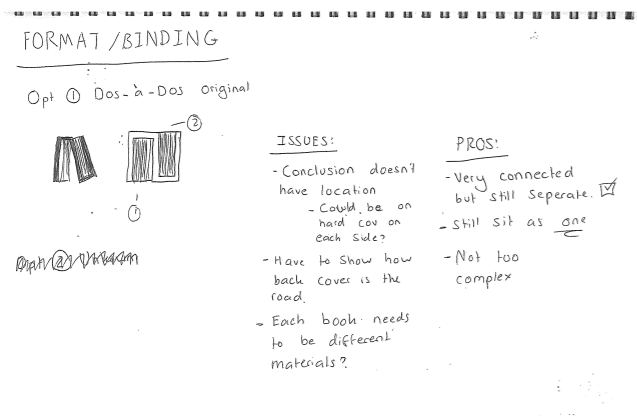
# Initial prototyping

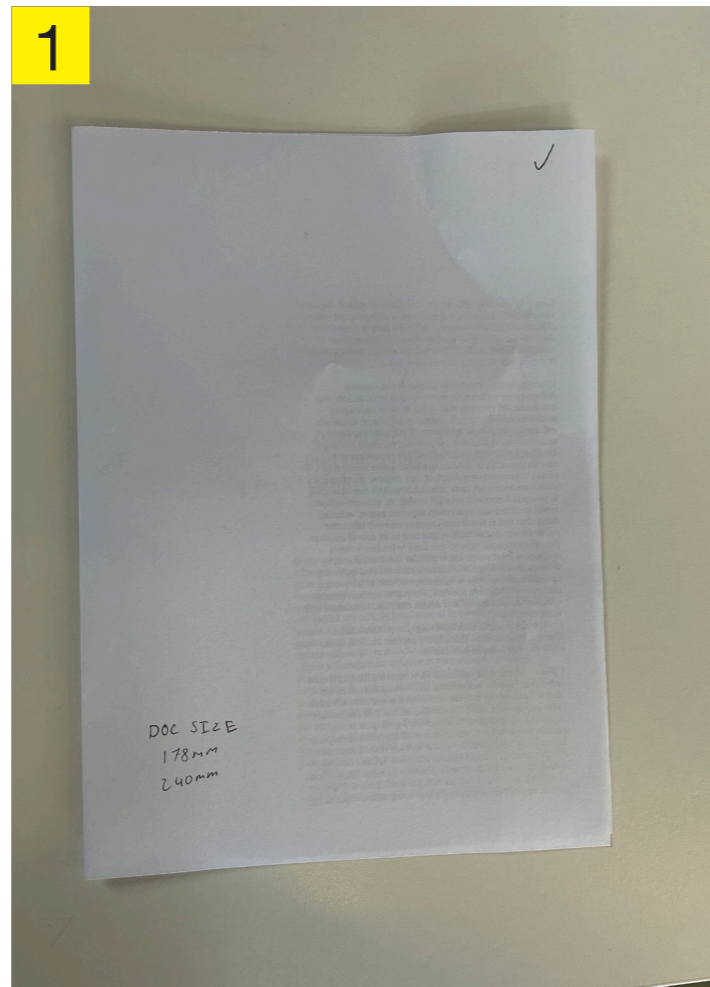




# Second prototyping

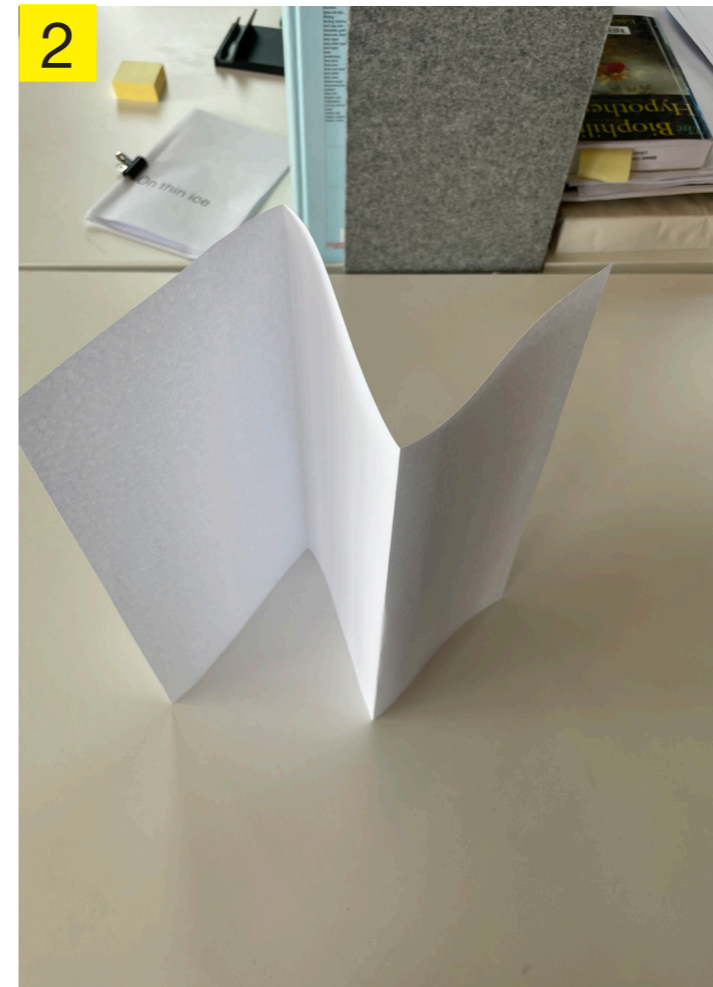


Finding the right size is crucial for my project as each book needs to tell its own story on their own and together. I wanted an inbetween size between A5 and A4 as neither felt right for my books. I opted to start with 178mm X 240mm which felt just right. On the right is a prototype made to show where my conjoined conclusion text will sit at the end of each piece to bring it all together. Each book will be stuck to one solid folded hard cover.



[1] My initial page size testing was 178mm X 240mm. I like the space this gives me to play around with type and statistics.

[2/3] The paper represents what the hard cover would be and each book would be stuck on either end. I will try the middle gap being where I put the conclusion and summary of both pieces.

→ Make sure expressive type is included throughout each book and not to get too deep into personal stories/pathways



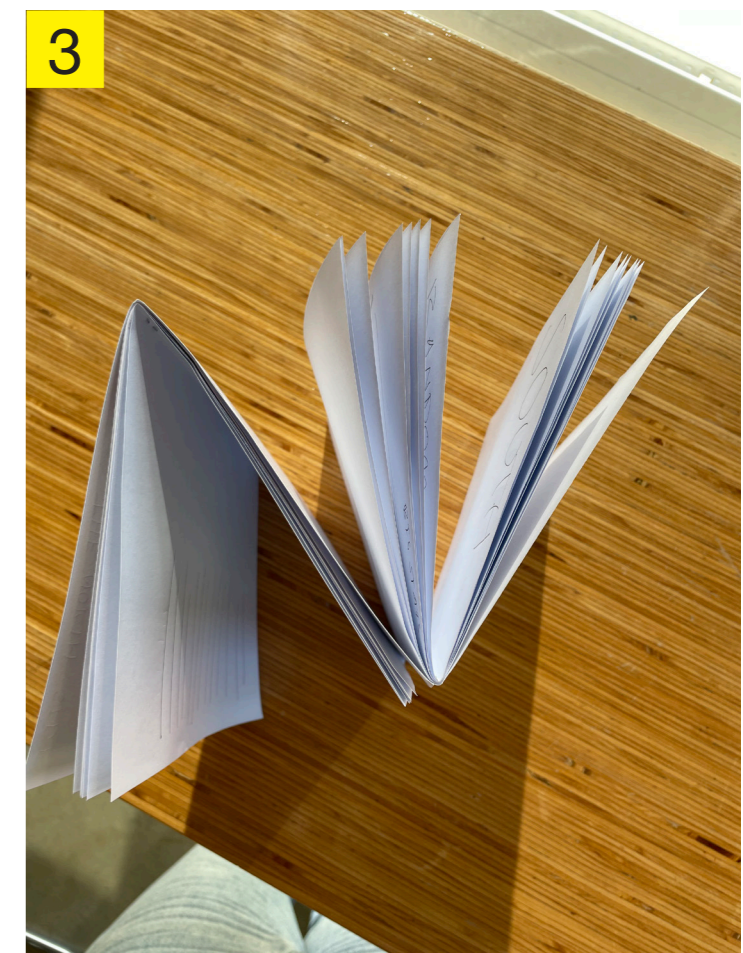
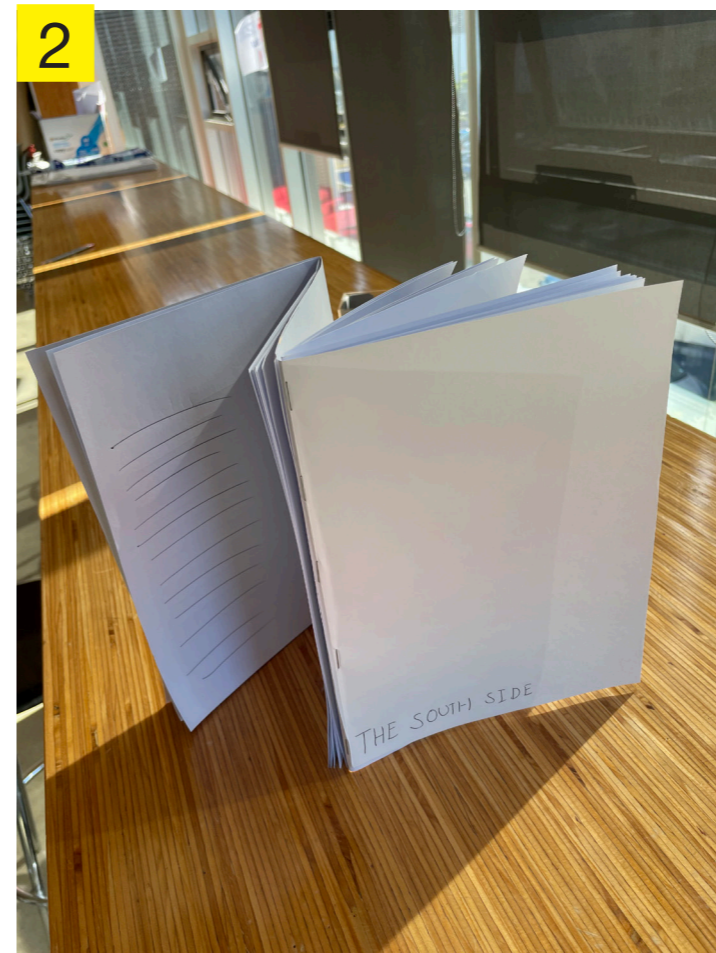
# Mockups/Dummy Copy

When creating this dummy mockup I wanted to figure out the flow of things and how the reader may pick the book up. After my previous prototypes, I've realised I cannot control the order in which the reader/viewer sees the book in therefore the extra conclusion doesn't make a lot of sense. Therefore, taking the conclusion out of the equation makes the book clear, evocative and fitting to my topic. Each book will be binded differently with different colours too to emphasise the difference of each side.



[1] The document set up I created was 178mm X 240mm. A custom Page size was my favourite choice and gives me more room to play around with expressive type in both books.

[2/3] Following my previous mockups I wanted to have each book attached together using the back pages rather than over complicating it with too many layers.





# Binding test

## Dos-à-dos binding “Dose-y-dough”

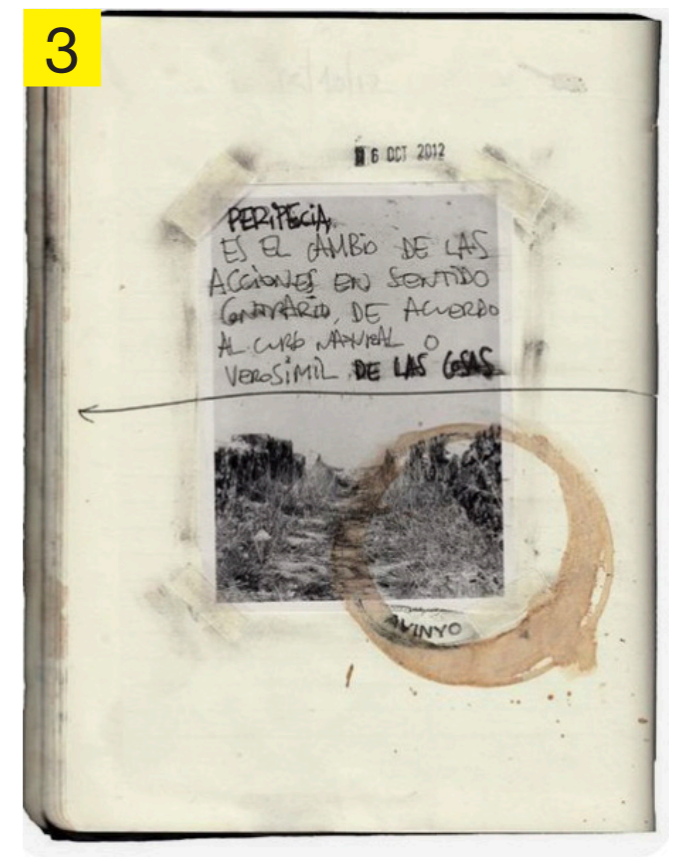
The purpose of using this binding method is to clearly represent each side of 8 Mile Road and the divide between the two.

They remain connected by the back covers.

[1] The North Side book will be perfect bounded with a hard clean white cover.

[2/3] The South Side book will be a scrapbook/rough leather cover.

A dos-à-dos binding is a binding structure in which two separate books are bound together such that the fore edge of one is adjacent to the spine of the other, with a shared lower board between them serving as the back cover of both.

# Final Binding?

Post feedback, using this new binding methods give me oppourtunity to visually and structurally represent the map itself. Also concept wise it fits well with what I have been doing already with the two opposite styles of each book. I want to user to be able to compare and see the drastic differences on each side to see the divide. I am unsure at this point if they will match up and read together or not but I think it could be very affective for my comparisons. That way, the user is able to make their own assumptions throughout the book and have both sides visible OR each read in their own time.

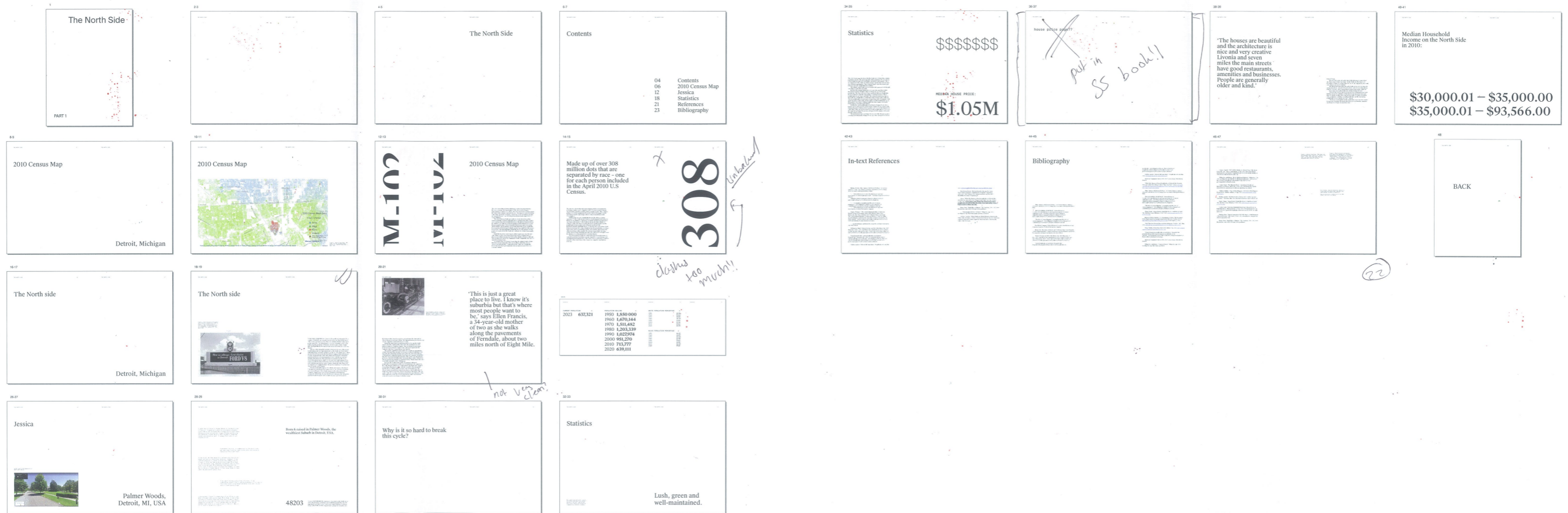
[1] After re-considering binding I have decided this method works best. It shows the connection between the two as well as visually representing the map itself. It also means it is easier for the user to compare and learn about each side at once. This way the contrast will be obvious.

[2] The only difference i'll make is that they will not read together but they will connect via a road in the middle which will match up. I aim to have it sitting in a cover with the introduction included in it.

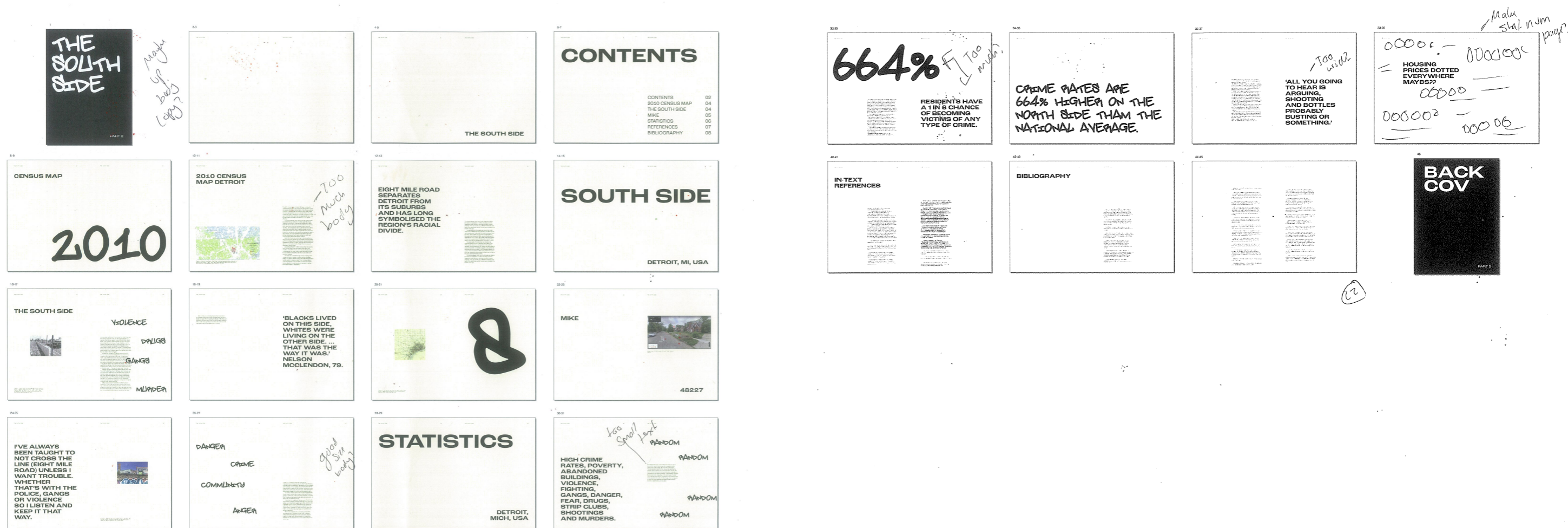

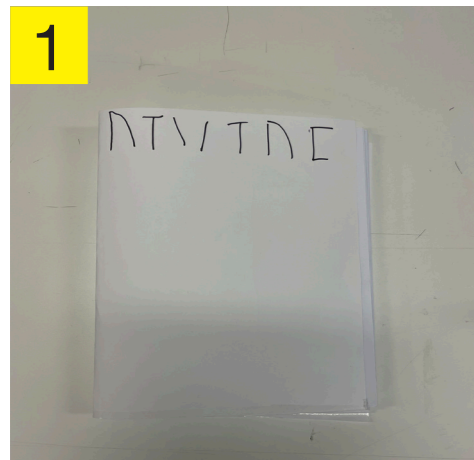
# Initial layouts - South side

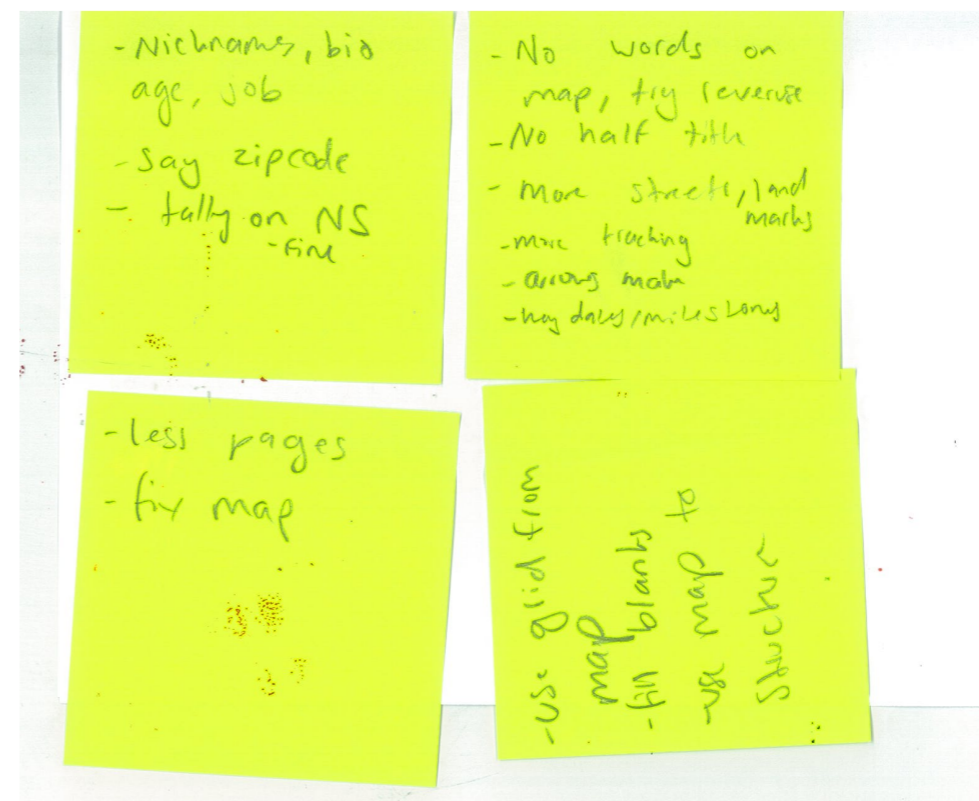




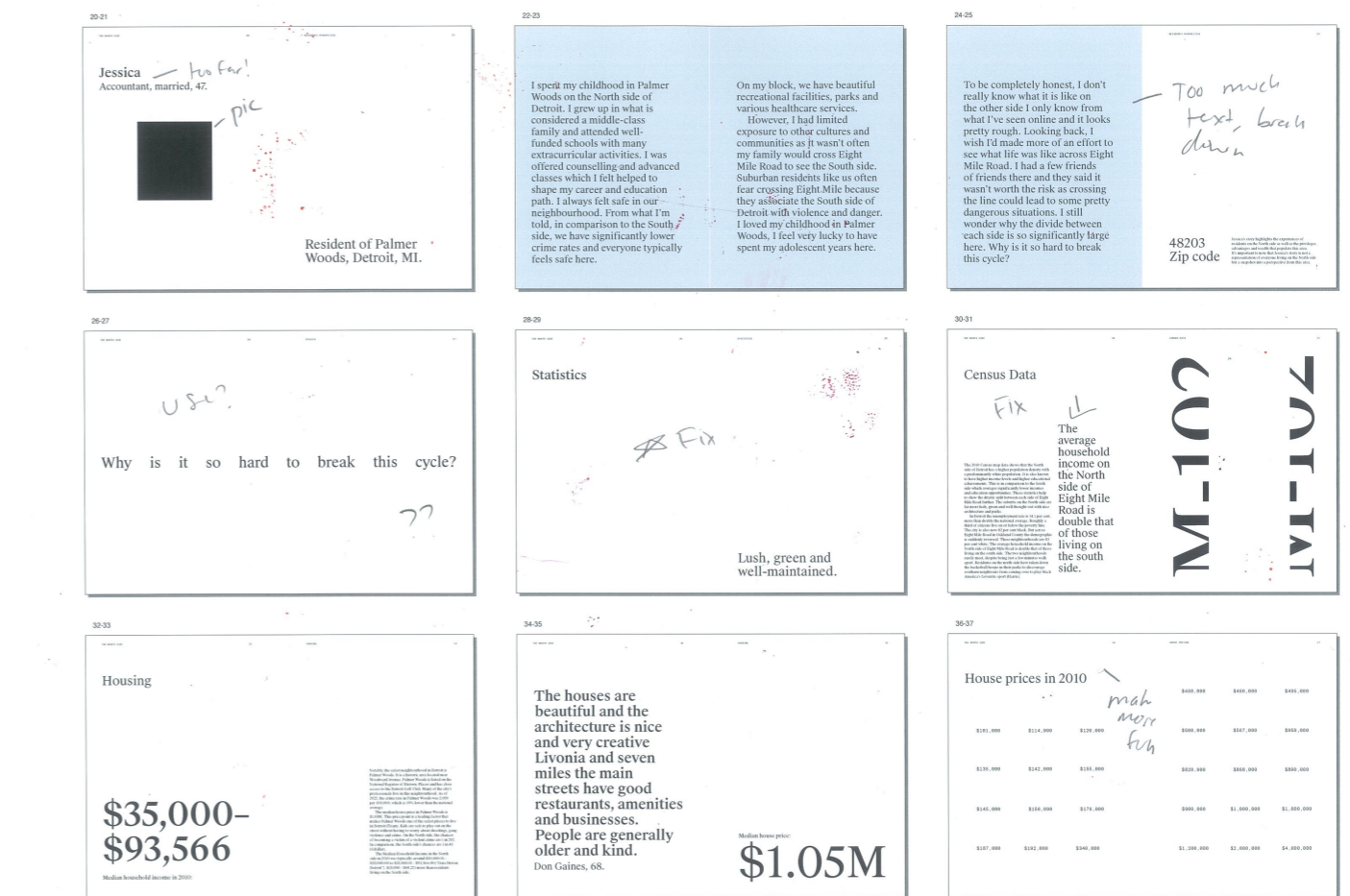
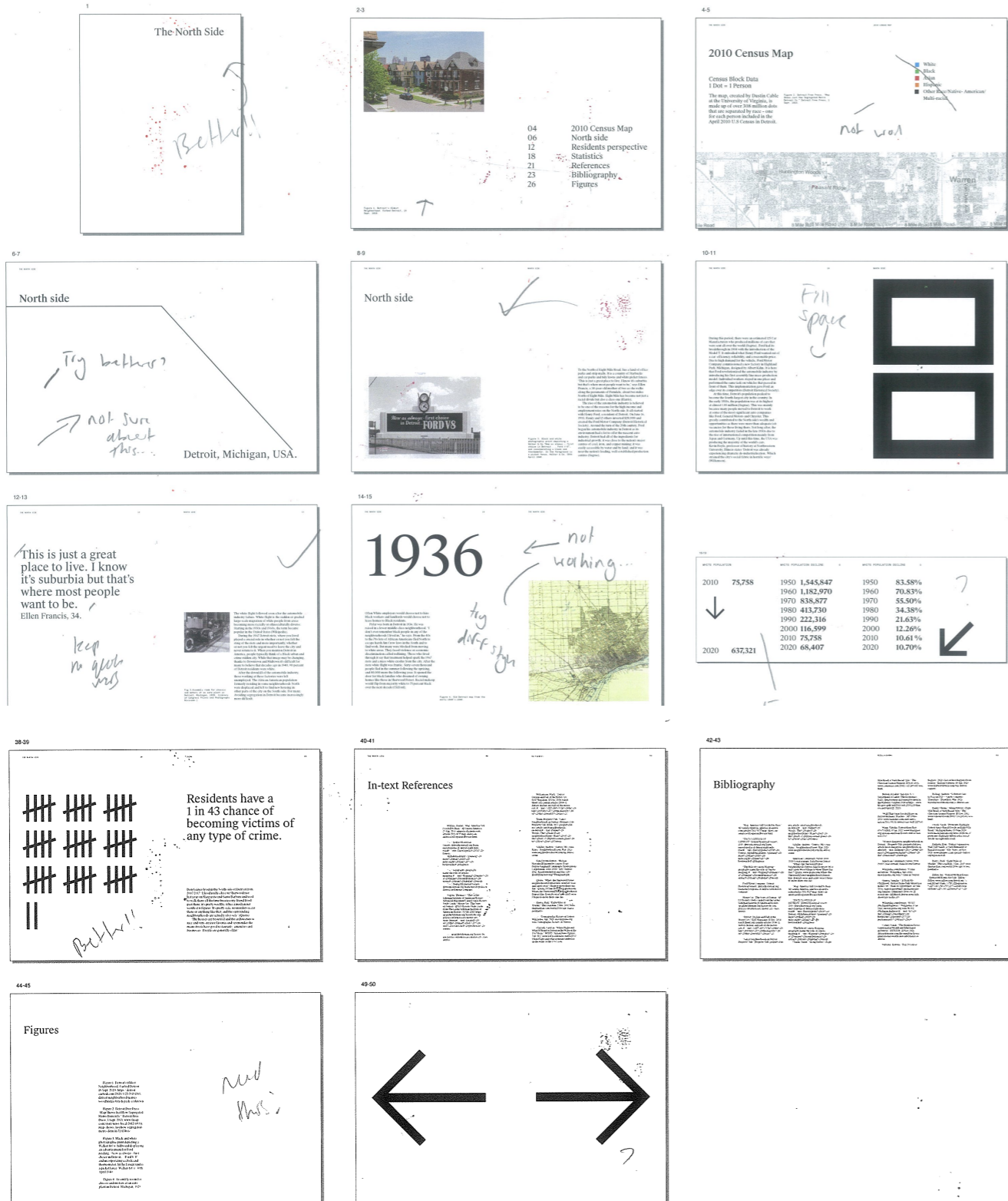
# Feedback

The introduction section was done quickly so isn't quite up to my standards but I have added more adjustments and elements since writing this.

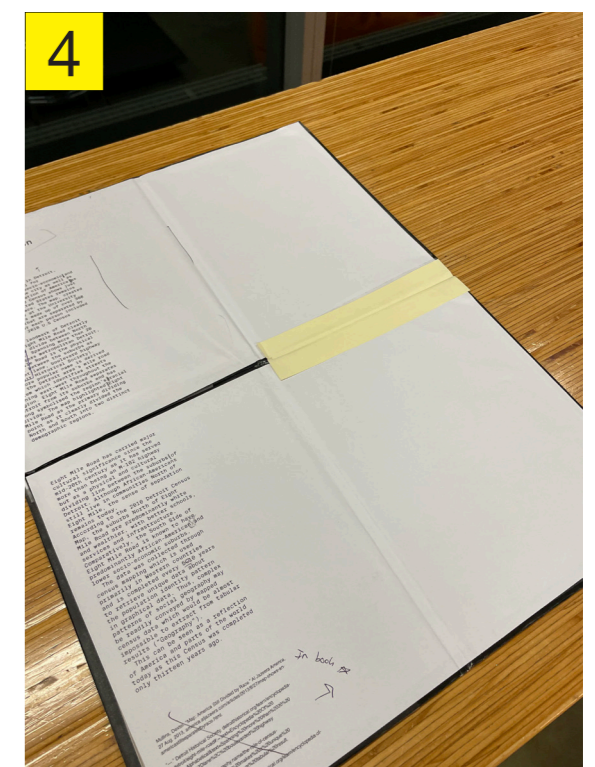
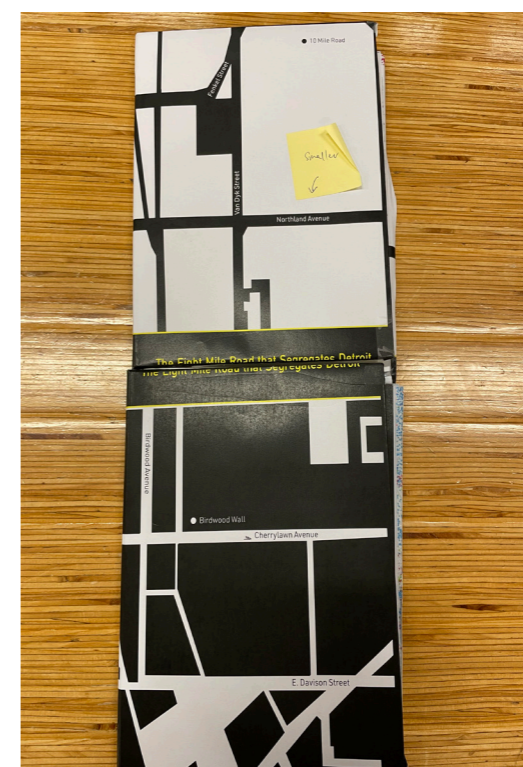
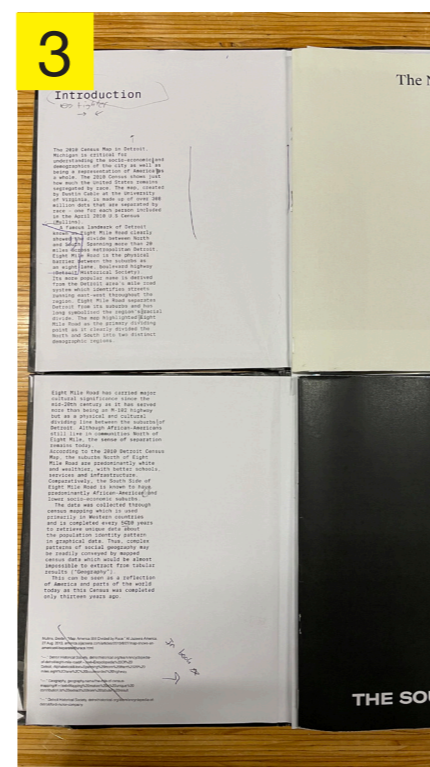
I loved how the hard cover worked and it will sit well with my fast back binded books as it holds each book together with a tabbed piece of card.



[1] This is the hand-made folder hard cover that I have tested. When sitting you only see the split title which refs to the road.

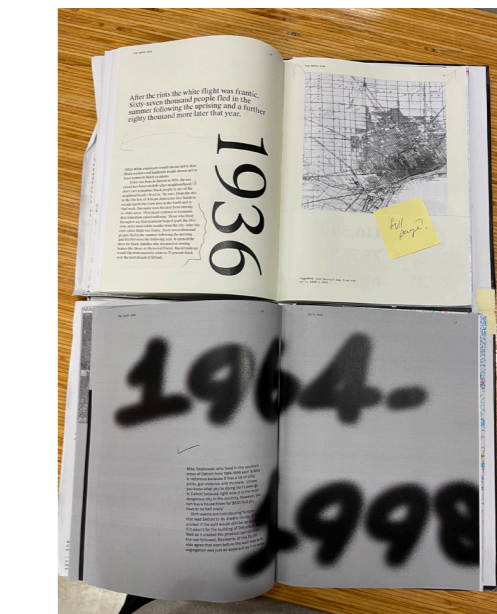
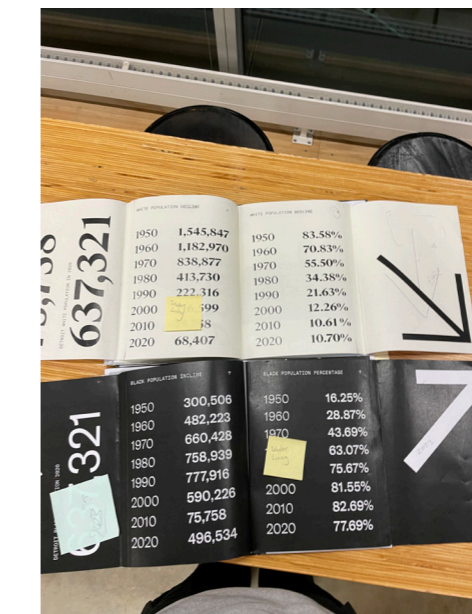
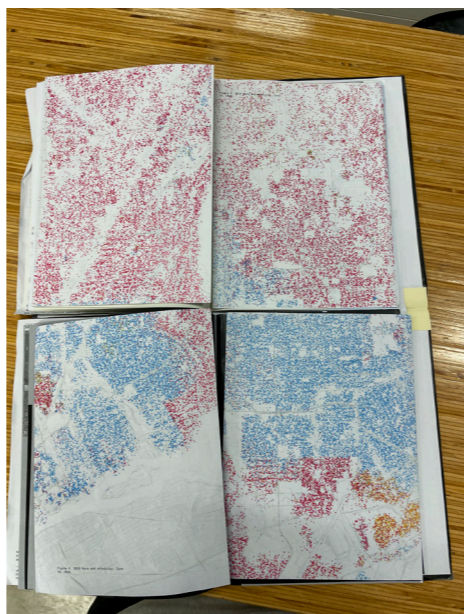
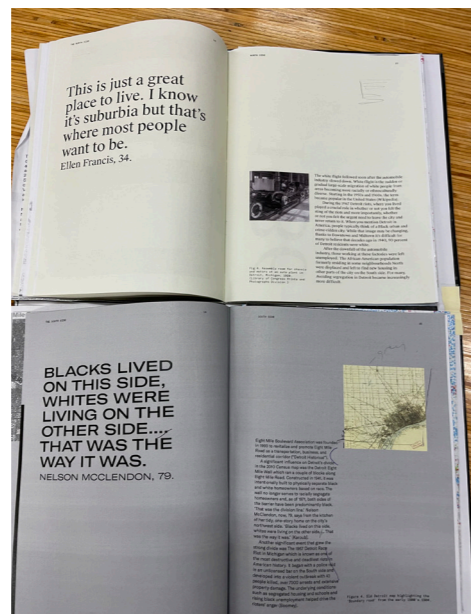
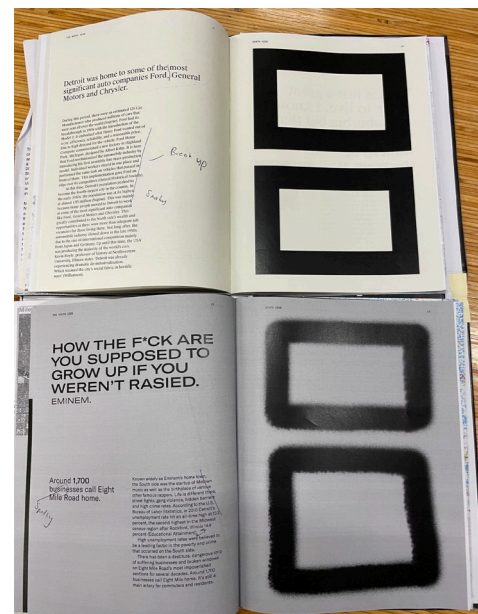
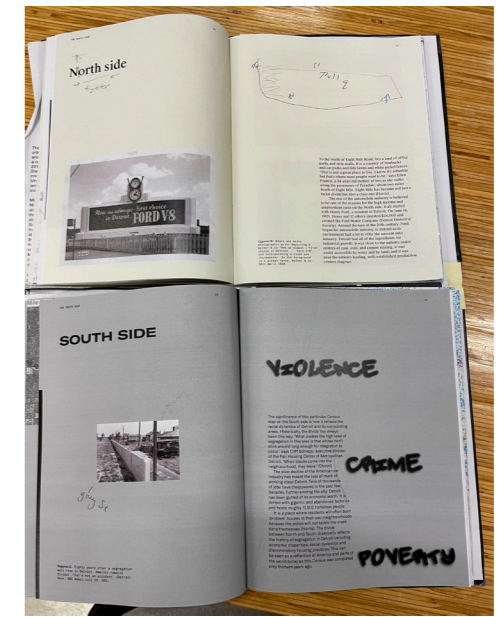
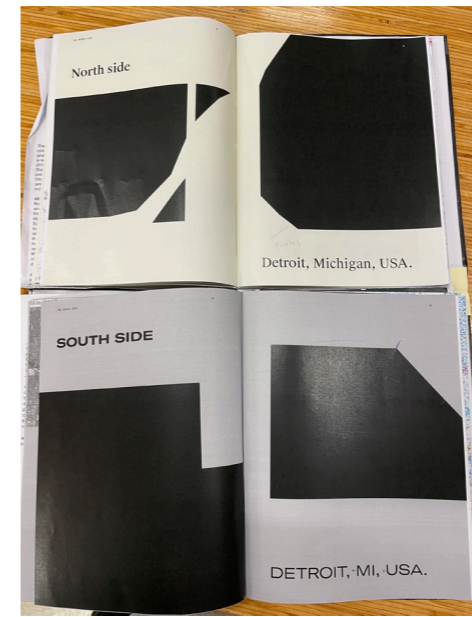
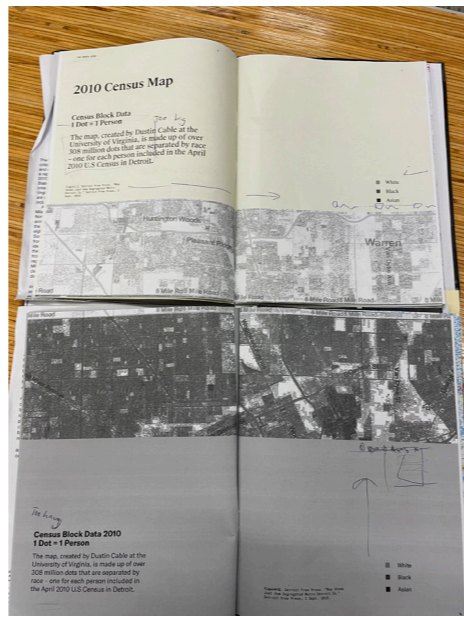
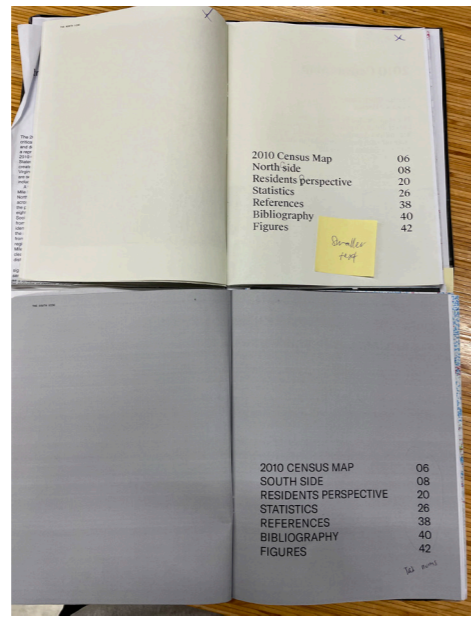



My main takings from my 1 on 1 feedback session were the following.

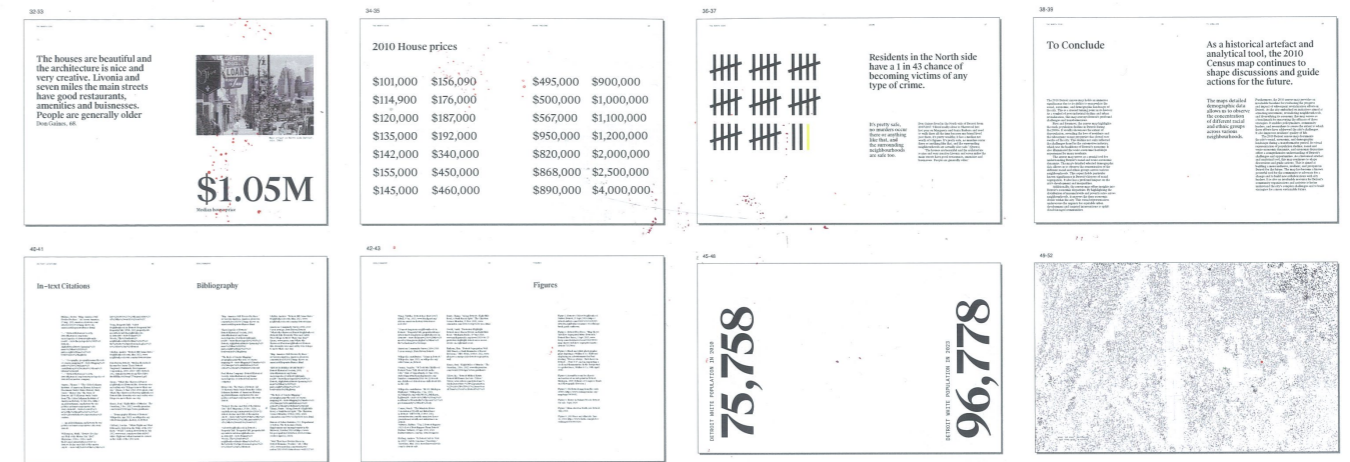

My final North side book layout is clean, cohesive and hints towards the rich and wealth of this side.

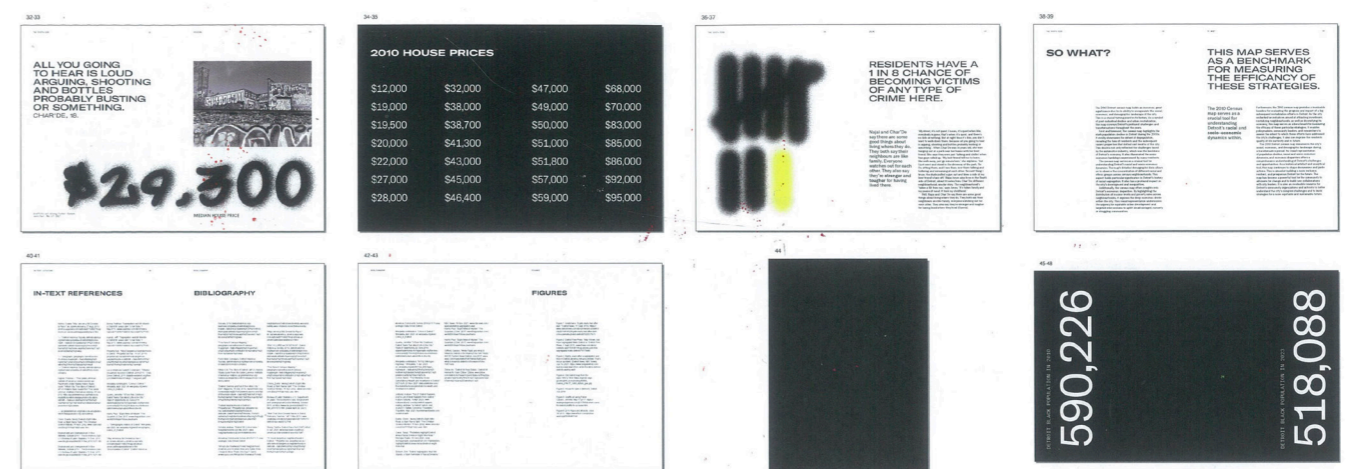
→ The margins are intentionally sat on the outside of the spreads to refer to the wealth.

My final South side book layout is grunge, rough and aesthetically represents the feel of this side.

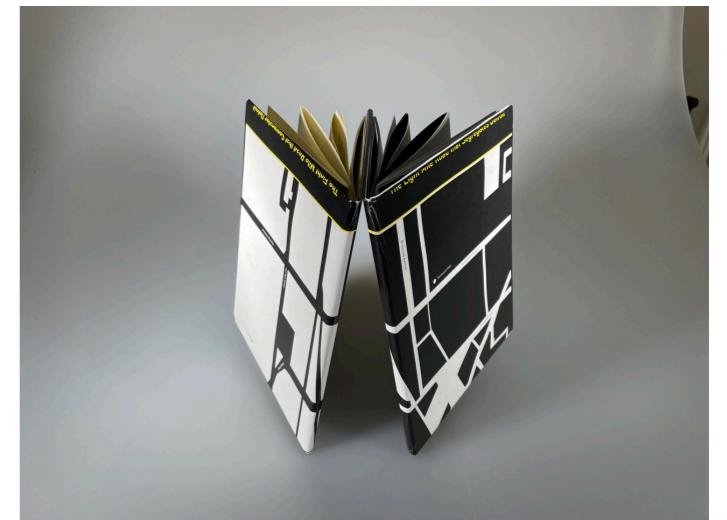
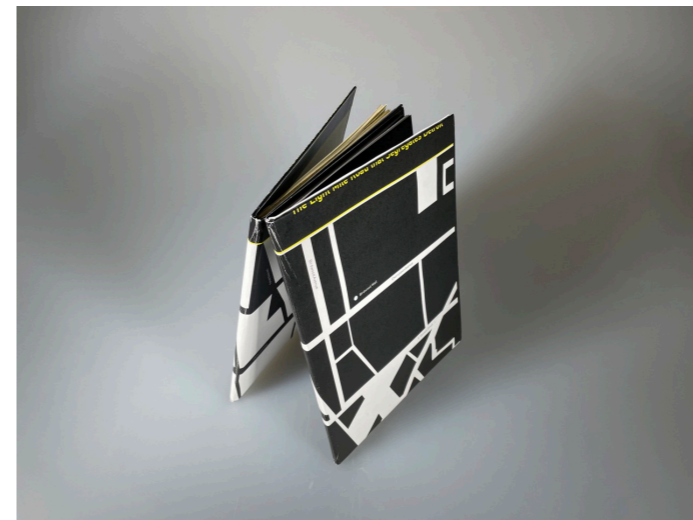
→ The expressive type is bold and strong to hint at the spray painted feel of the streets and to enhance the contrast between the two.
